Prof Bouma is head of the School of Political and Social Inquiry at Monash University. His research has primarily focussed on the interaction between religion and society in Western societies including Canada, The United States, Australia, New Zealand and Europe. His current work includes a major study of religious plurality in multicultural Australia making strategic comparisons with other societies, research into gender and the management of religious diversity focussing on women and Islam in China, Malaysia and Japan, an attempt to delineate Australia's religious Affiliation and continuing work on Post-Modernity as a context for interfaith dialogue and theological reflection.

Dr Thomas Reuter

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Position and Research Interests

Dr Thomas Reuter has taught at the University of Heidelberg, Germany, and has held ARC Post-doctoral and Queen Elizabeth II Fellowships at the University of Melbourne. He joined the School of Political and Social Inquiry at Monash University as a Senior Research Fellow in 2006. Since 1992, Dr Reuter's ethnographic research projects have been focused entirely on Indonesia, the world's most popular Muslim nation. Over the past six years, Dr Reuter's research and publications have focused specifically on the island of Java, where he has been seeking explanations for the recent proliferation of religious revival movements. Dr Reuter has also recently published on topics relating to the tension between local knowledge and rapid cultural and religious change, associated with increasing third world participation in processes of globalisation. This theoretical approach sheds light on the changing face of Islam in Indonesia from the perspective of broader global developments.
